

On Friday we had a free day. Some stayed at camp, while others toured the small towns surrounding Platte City. There was a group of us that hadn't been to the Arabia Steamboat. When the Steamboat Arabia sank in 1856, the passengers and crew survived, but the 200-tons of frontier cargo was lost to the river. In 1988, five steamboat enthusiasts from the Kansas City area successfully recovered the Arabia and her cargo, where generations before them had failed.



What I found interesting was that the 5 men (two of whom were a restaurant owner and an owner of a family refrigeration business) and their families financed this project on their own without any assistance from the government. David Hawley and Jerry Mackey, 2 of the 5 men involved in the project, were at the museum answering questions and telling stories about the recovery which really brought everything to life.

Dinner was at the **Avalon Café**, a staple of historic Weston for 26 years. It's located in an antebellum home, originally built in 1848, called "White Lace" for all the white, lacy gingerbread that adorns the long front porch.



American Bistro-style fare was prepared by our chef and owner, David Scott.
